





Asian Pacific Minnesotan Population Size, by Ancestry or Ethnic Origin.






Ten Most Frequently Selected Priority Issues

Hmong





Geography:

- 18th and 19th centuries: Laos, Vietnam, Thailand and Burma.
- Major communities in United States:
 - Minnesota (especially the Twin Cities and cities like St. Paul)
 - California (Fresno, Sacramento, Merced)
 - Wisconsin (Milwaukee, Wausau, La Crosse)
 - Others: North Carolina & Michigan

<u>Languages:</u>

- White Hmong (Hmoob Dawb): Known for softer tones and more nasal pronunciation.
- Green Hmong (Hmoob Ntsuab): Has slightly different vocabulary and tones; spoken in parts of Laos and by many Hmong Americans.

Major festivals:

 Hmong New Year, known as "Noj Peb Caug" (literally "Eat Thirty")

Cuisine style:

- Influenced by the regions -- mainly China, Laos, Vietnam, and Thailand.
- Staple foods: Sticky Rice (Mov Nplaum) and White Rice (Mov Dawb).
- Popular Dishes: Boiled Chicken with Herbs (Qaib Hau) or Boiled Pork with Mustard Greens

- Spiritual and Ancestor Belief System.
- Soul (Plig) Beliefs.
- Clan System.
- Family & Respect for Elders.
- Marriage and Gender Roles.
- Funeral Rites and Afterlife.
- Herbal Medicine and Natural Healing.
- Fate and Destiny. Modesty and Privacy.

Vietnamese



Geography:

- Officially the Socialist Republic of Vietnam. At eastern edge of mainland Southeast Asia, shares borders with China (north), Laos and Cambodia (west), and the South China Sea to the east and south.
- Many of the Vietnamese Americans immigrated to the US following the end of the Vietnam War in 1975.
- 2.3 million Vietnamese Americans.
 - Major communities in California and Texas.

Major festivals:

- Tết is the Vietnamese New Year, the most important festival in Vietnam
 - Marks the beginning of the lunar calendar.
 - Time for family reunions, honoring ancestors, and wishing for good luck in the new year.

Languages:

- Vietnamese is national language
- Minority groups also speak a variety of other languages such as Tay, Muong, Khmer, and Hmong.

Cuisine style:

- Rice is the staple food
- Rice noodles also highlight Vietnamese cuisine with lots of soup dishes.
- Cuisine is based around five fundamental taste "elements" including: spicy; sour; salty; sweet, and sometimes bitter.
- Street food is one highlighted characteristics around the world.

<u>Cultural Beliefs that most people</u> <u>share/practice:</u>

- Spiritual and ancestor worship
- Respect for community and family values
- Manual labor beliefs (agriculture; crafting/artisan, street vendors

economy....)

Korean



Geography:

- Both N. & S. Korea occupy the southern portion of the Korean peninsula.
- South Korea is bordered by the N.
 Korea (north), the East Sea (Sea of
 Japan) (east), the East China
 Sea (south), and the Yellow
 Sea (west); to the southeast it is
 separated from the Japanese island
 of Tsushima by the Korea Strait.
- South Korea makes up about 45 percent of the peninsula's land area.
- The capital is <u>Seoul</u>.
